

We, the team of IGC would like to thank each and every guest who made the convention a grand success.







### The expert voice: Why great media sellers never sell combs to the bald

We're living in a world where attention is the most valuable currency. With fragmented media, shorter consumer attention spans and a digital ecosystem flooded with content, building trust has become the biggest challenge and the greatest opportunity for anyone in media sales and advertising.

But here's the truth I've learned after 21+ years in this space: the best media professionals don't try to sell a comb to someone who's bald. They don't pitch products,

they provide purpose-driven solutions.

As media sellers, our job has shifted from simply selling ad space to becoming true consultants. We're not order-takers. We're problem-solvers. That shift begins with a deep understanding of your client's brand story, challenges, audience and growth

Yet in the race to meet targets, many forget the core principle: people don't buy plans, they buy people.

Your personal brand is your real business card.

In my career, from radio and television to OTT and influencer marketing I've seen that clients respond most to authenticity. They trust people who communicate with clarity, who truly listen and who speak with insight, not just data. That's where personal branding becomes not just useful, but essential.

Whether you're an individual consultant or leading a sales team in a large network, your personal brand must reflect three things: credibility, consistency and connection.

Credibility comes from your experience, yes but also from how well you translate that experience into value for your

- clients.
- Consistency means showing up with the same values across every touchpoint. LinkedIn posts, meetings, podcasts, even emails.
- Connection is what makes people say "yes" to you before you've even presented the proposal.

Too often, content in this space becomes robotic filled with buzzwords, charts and jargon. But business decisions are still made by humans and humans respond to stories. You don't have to be loud, you have to be  $\qquad \qquad \text{real. Clients remember how you made them} \\$ feel, not how many slides you showed.

#### So, what does effective media selling look like today?

- It's consultative, not transactional.
- It's story-led, not data-drowned.
- And it's aligned, not generic.

This is the era of values-based sales. When clients choose a partner, they aren't just choosing a platform, they're choosing your perspective, your problem-solving ability and your personal integrity.

And here's where I bring it all together: through personal branding, podcast storytelling, and thought leadership development, I help my teammates position themselves more powerfully.

Because ultimately, people want to work with those who get them. Who speak their language. Who don't waste time offering combs to the bald but instead, offer real solutions for real needs.

### The slow unpeeling: The map I wish I'd had when I left corporate life

If you're standing at the edge of leaving a steady job and don't have a map, this is the guidance I wish someone had given me...

On a November morning in 2022, I woke up and couldn't stop shaking. For four days, I stayed in bed, and the life I'd been building - long hours, constant availability, the

badge of being "always on" — felt unbearable. That was the moment everything changed.

For nearly seven years, my world had been calendars, client calls, and deadlines that stretched my days from 9:00 AM to 2:00 AM the next day. I told myself it was



temporary. By the time I earned my ACCA qualification and settled into the Big Four rhythm, exhaustion felt part of the job description.

Leaving wasn't immediate. It was a slow unpeeling: a decision made in private and sealed with fear. By December 2023, I handed in my notice. And then the easy part — the exit — was over. What came next was messy

I spent 2024 learning how to make choices that hadn't been assigned to me. Traveling to places like Tenerife, the Philippines, Bali, and Oman taught me how to decide for myself. Going to Bali alone pushed me out of my comfort zone, and the strangers I met there became a temporary family, showing me the power of connection and vulnerability. That confidence carried me forward - after a year of exploring and growing, I made a bold move to France without speaking fluent French. Navigating bureaucracy and grocery shopping in a new language became its own kind of education in humility and resilience.

In January 2025, I launched my business. The launch didn't answer the unasked questions. There was no manager assigning urgency, no team calendar dictating my day, and the polished persona I wore in meetings felt performative off-stage. The practical bits — invoices, contracts, and pricing — required attention. The harder work was quieter: unlearning that my value is measured in hours, accepting that clarity arrives through motion, and letting go of needing to prove myself before I belong.

What's working is less dramatic than I expected. Owning my time has helped me protect my energy. I've learned to say "no" in ways that feel like survival rather than selfishness. Conversations that begin with curiosity, not transaction, have become the relationships that sustain me. Showing up as myself — imperfect and human — has become a surprising business advantage.

There are real costs. I miss the predictability of a paycheck and the rhythm of a team. I still compare my progress to others who seem further along. But the trade-off autonomy, alignment with my values, a life that feels authored by me - has been worth the uncertainty.

I began this journey with only 25% of the answers, and every day I get closer to 100%. Today, I help senior leaders navigate career transitions—whether they choose to stay in or leave corporate life. If my missteps, practical takeaways, and small wins can make that journey easier for someone else, then telling this story has been more than worth it.

### The silent strength: Women of lower Waziristan

their resilience is nothing short of extraordinary. For over a decade and a half, Lower Waziristan has been the epicenter of military operations aimed at dismantling terrorism. While these efforts were necessary for national security, they have also left deep scars on the region's social and educational fabric. Entire villages were displaced. Lives were uprooted. And in the process, schools especially those for girls were destroyed or shut down. Education, a basic human right, became a dangerous dream. Armed groups openly declared female education as "un-Islamic," bombing school buildings and threatening teachers. Many families were forced to choose between their daughters' safety and their future. As a result, the literacy rate among women in Lower Waziristan remains one of the lowest in the country.

In some areas, not a single girls' high school exists. In my village alone, more than 5,700 girls are out of school, not because they lack ambition, but because they lack access. With roads damaged, security uncertain, and school buildings reduced to rubble, these young girls are left with no choice but to

Hidden behind the rugged hills and tribal traditions of Pakistan's Lower Waziristan lies a silent struggle — one that has endured for over 15 years. It is the story of thousands of women and girls whose lives have been shaped by conflict, terrorism, and neglect. Their voices are rarely heard, yet

stay home — their dreams confined to the four walls of their houses. But the challenges extend beyond education. The years of conflict have led to a complete breakdown in basic services. Healthcare, especially for women, is almost non-existent. Most women give birth at home without medical assistance, and female doctors are nearly impossible to be found in the region. This has contributed to high maternal mortality rates and poor health outcomes. Access to information and opportunities is another barrier. In a digital age, most households in Lower Waziristan still lack internet, electricity, or even mobile connectivity. Economic independence for women is rare, and traditional gender roles, reinforced by years



progress. Yet, in the face of all this adversity, the women of Lower Waziristan remain strong. They are mothers, sisters, daughters, and caretakers. They raise children while coping with trauma, manage homes without support, and still hold on to hope. Their strength lies not in visibility, but in endurance. It is time their struggles and their strength - are acknowledged. Change will not come overnight, but it must begin with investment in girls' education. We need to rebuild schools, train female teachers, and ensure safe learning environments. We need health centers staffed with women professionals. And most importantly, we need to shift mindsets through community dialogue, awareness programs, and support from religious and tribal leaders.These women don't want sympathy. They want **opportunity**. They want to learn, to work, and to raise the next generation in peace. Their empowerment is not just a moral obligation — it's the key to sustainable development in the region. To the world, Lower Waziristan may appear remote. But to the women who live there, it is home — a place they dream of rebuilding, not just with bricks, but with education, dignity, and hope.

### Dr Nicola's contribution at the Ishkama Global Change Convention – Port of Spain, Trinidad (17–20 July 2025)

From 17th to 20th July 2025, Dr Nicola, Director of Education for Stop Traffiking Worldwide CIC, participated in the Ishkama Global Change (IGC) Convention, held in Port of Spain, Trinidad, in the Caribbean. This international event convened global advocates, educators, policymakers, and change-makers dedicated to addressing urgent social and

humanitarian issues through collective action.

Representing Stop Traffiking Worldwide CIC, Dr Nicola delivered a powerful presentation on the subject of modern slavery, focusing particularly on organ trafficking, the exploitation of girls, and the broader societal consequences of these crimes. Her speech highlighted the hidden and systemic nature of trafficking networks and the urgent need for widespread education and preventative strategies.

Dr Nicola emphasised that modern slavery is not an isolated issue but a structural one, affecting families, communities, and public systems across nations. She advocated for increased public awareness, early intervention, and tailored youth engagement strategies that empower young people to identify and respond to signs of exploitation.

As part of her vision for wider outreach, Dr Nicola shared her intention to produce short-form educational videos, each under two minutes in length, designed specifically for social media platforms. These videos, which she plans to release in multiple languages, will serve as accessible tools to reach youth globally—particularly those in vulnerable or high-risk environments. The initiative is rooted in her belief that youth-led awareness through digital media can play a transformative role in prevention.

In addition, she introduced her broader goal of developing a free, multilingual global education platform, which would offer open-access resources for students, parents, teachers, and frontline workers. This platform aims to remove linguistic and financial barriers, making critical knowledge on human trafficking available to all, regardless of background or location.

Dr Nicola also expressed a keen interest in collaborating with UK-based youth organisations such as St John Ambulance and the Air Cadet Programme, proposing that anti-trafficking education be embedded within

youth leadership, wellbeing, and personal development programmes. These partnerships, she argued, are essential for fostering resilience and proactive awareness among the next generation.

Her contribution at the IGC Convention underscored the importance of forward-thinking, youth-focused, and globally inclusive strategies in the fight against human trafficking. Dr Nicola's commitment reflects a powerful blend of educational ambition, social responsibility, and a deep understanding of the challenges faced by young people today.

## Healing through heritage: Lennox Joseph's grassroots vision for Africa

Lennox Joseph is a humanitarian visionary whose life work is rooted in healing, of people, cultures, and communities. As the Founder of The H.E.L.P Team (Healing Every Living Person), a UK-based nonprofit organization, she has been at the forefront of African heritage and development initiatives.

Her work bridges wellness, culture, and sustainability to empower underserved populations.

Since 2016, Lennox and her husband have lived and worked across Africa, travelling overland from Morocco to Mauritania, Senegal, The Gambia, and now Nigeria. Their grassroots journey has taken them deep into rural communities where they have listened, learned, and worked closely with elders, traditional healers, women, and youth. At the heart of their mission is a simple but powerful belief: food is medicine.

From reviving traditional food practices to promoting herbal healing, Lennox champions the idea that local knowledge and resources, when honoured, can create sustainable health solutions. She encourages people to use their own produce and ancestral wisdom to nourish themselves. Food is medicine. Culture is therapy.

One of The H.E.L.P Team's most urgent initiatives is its clean

water campaign, aimed at providing access to safe drinking water for underserved communities in Nigeria. At a time when water insecurity continues to affect health and livelihoods, Lennox's team is mobilising resources, partnerships, and local leadership to ensure communities can thrive.

Another key initiative focuses on the restoration of sacred sites as cultural heritage landmarks. These spaces are not only spiritual and historical but, they also serve as tools for education, tourism, climate resilience, and intergenerational healing. When communities preserve and honour these sacred places, they restore pride, strengthen identity, and open pathways for sustainable human capital development.

Working closely with traditional leaders and local artisans, Lennox is championing a model that integrates conservation, cultural education, and youth empowerment. This includes training young people in indigenous knowledge systems, natural building methods, and storytelling. These approaches help protect intangible heritage while creating economic opportunity.

The H.E.L.P Team also uses natural building materials, plants medicinal gardens, and creates experiences that reconnect

people with ancestral wisdom. These initiatives support women's wellbeing, strengthen youth resilience, and foster enterprise rooted in cultural pride.

Aligned with their advocacy goals, Lennox and The H.E.L.P Team are engaging with Nigeria's Ministry of Arts, Culture, Tourism and Creative Economy. Together, they are pushing for culture to be recognised as a core pillar in the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. Their advocacy emphasises the essential role of heritage in education, mental health, climate adaptation, and inclusive growth.

Culture and heritage hold the keys to healing. By honouring the past, communities can unlock a future rooted in strength, sustainability, and self-worth.

### Jamaica Cannabis investment

Pharmacan Biotechnology Solutions Ltd., through its subsidiary Pharmacan Business Consultancy Services, is developing a compliant medical cannabis cultivation and export operation in Jamaica historically recognized as a key cannabis-growing

The company has relationships with pharmaceutical healthcare professionals in Europe, particularly in Germany and Portugal, that are aligned with certified importers and distributors. These partners possess the required licensing for medical cannabis importation, manufacturing, distribution, and retail sales, primarily to pharmacies across Germany.

Germany represents Europe's most mature and regulated medicinal cannabis market, with over 18,000 pharmacies and a projected demand of more than 100 tonnes of medical cannabis in 2025. The German market, which classified cannabis as a non-narcotic as of April 2024 under the new Cannabis Act (CanG), is forecasted to reach € billion in annual medical cannabis sales by 2025. Pharmacan's partners already provide outreach, distribution, customs clearance, and marketing to licensed German pharmacies.



This business seeks to raise USD \$150,000 in startup funding. The investment will cover a GACP- GMP compliant medical cannabis cultivation facility category 3 hurricane-proof greenhouse infrastructure in St. Ann, Jamaica, a region historically associated with cannabis production. The financial model projects three cultivation cycles per year, each offering approximately 30% ROI, equating to an annual return of 90% over four years.

The company is committed to delivering high-quality, researchinformed cannabis products to the European healthcare sector, leveraging regulatory compliance, established distribution channels, and certified professional expertise.

This investment offers a unique opportunity to enter the regulated and expanding European medical cannabis market via a Jamaican-grown, scientifically supported, and exportready cannabis product. Pharmacan Biotechnology Solutions Ltd., through its subsidiary Pharmacan Business Consultancy Services, is focused on cultivating GACP (Good Agricultural and Collection Practices)- GMP(Good Manufacturing Practices) -certified medical cannabis in Jamaica for export to European pharmaceutical, clinical, and nutraceutical markets. The company intends to cultivate high-quality cannabis products to established foreign importers and distributors, particularly in Germany and Portugal, where it maintains existing partnerships.

Pharmacan's mission is to establish Jamaica's GACP/GMPcertified medical cannabis export industry, enabling the country to participate in the growing global medicinal cannabis trade. The company aims to position Jamaican cannabis as a trusted, science-backed product in regulated healthcare markets, starting with Germany, the largest medicinal cannabis market in Europe.

The long-term vision is to become a leading exporter of highquality, pharmacologically validated Jamaican cannabis, contributing to patient care, scientific innovation, and regulatory compliance across international borders.

Pharmacan seeks to drive Jamaican representation in the legal, medicinal cannabis supply chain, ensuring that the country gains from its indigenous strains and agricultural expertise.
